What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	33%	We offered swimming to this cohort when they were in Year 2 (Spring Term 2020). Unfortunately these sessions were cut short due to the Covid outbreak. Due to a change in swimming strategy, these children did not go swimming again in Year 3, Year 4 and Year 5. We had 3 children start during late Year 6 who could not swim at all. There were two further children who would not enter the pool. This meant 33% of the cohort were not able to make any progress and limited our achievement percentage.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	33%	

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	67%	All children attending and entering the pool achieved this important aspect of the swimming expectations.

Have you done this?	No	We did not need to use this as other children in our school were already attending swimming lessons and so the Year 6s went with them.
